


Book Collection and Sorting




Program Committee May Business Meeting/Potluck by Valerie Grash

Lisa holds a B.A. in English Literature and an M.L.S. from the University of Pittsburgh and a Ph.D. in Literature and Criticism from Indiana University of Pennsylvania. She began her career as a reference librarian at Juniata College and at the University of Pittsburgh at Johnstown. In 1994, she accepted a post at the United



States Department of Justice National Drug Intelligence Center (NDIC) as Supervisory Librarian, and she was promoted to Analytical Research Unit Supervisor. Returning to higher education, she became Director of the Library at Mount Aloysius College. In 2003, Lisa went to work for Libraries for the Future, a national nonprofit based in Manhattan, with a 3 year grant from the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation to train public librarians on current technology. Lisa served under this grant as the Pennsylvania State Equal Access Program Coordinator. In 2010, Lisa published *Re-Presentations of Dante Gabriel Rossetti: Portrayals in Fiction, Drama, Music and Film.* Amherst, N.Y.: Cambria Press. Finally, Lisa was Academic Advising Coordinator and Humanities Instructor at Pennsylvania Highlands Community College.

Lisa is currently a board member of the Peer Empowerment Network (PEN). PEN provides services and community to people with mental illnesses. She loves to read and travel with her husband Robert. She loves to garden. In 2020, Lisa was elected by the congregation of Christ Lutheran Church to serve on the Church Council from January 2021 to January 2025. She tries to write every day. She has been a regular contributor to *The Review of the Pre-Raphaelite Society* beginning in 2011, and has started writing for the *Johnstown Magazine* in 2022. As a young woman, Jo wanted to be a doctor. Her Italian born father wanted to send her to the best medical school in Italy. After being accepted and travelling to Italy, she began school only to discover that she could not stand the sight of blood! As Dad had paid for her travel to Italy, he told Jo she would have to fund her own way back! So, Jo found work as a translator at the Australian Embassy. Not only did she acquire the fare home, but a husband to bring home with her!

A stay-at-home Mom early on, Jo became involved in school matters, serving as PTA President. When her husband became ill, Jo, with her background in science, went back to school for a degree in Chemistry, a field outside the norm for women, but that didn't stop Jo! Her determination led to a 19-year career as a Chemistry teacher at Vo-tech. Joining AAUW in 1994, Jo willingly plunged right in and in short order (with some friendly persuasion from Anne Fattman and me) became Branch President.



We were 15 strong at the Backpack Project on Monday and not only helped a worthy cause but had fun too! Next month provides another opportunity and it's one that several of us have volunteered for in the past.

Our Gateway to Equity Award winner, Dr. Barbara Zaborowski developed and has grown the "One Book" program for over a decade, to the point where over 1,200 students and their teachers are registered to participate this year. Students from all over the area, generally in grades 5 through 8, have read the same book and will meet in groups over the course of three days, May 15, 16, and 17. They will meet the author of the book and participate in a variety of activities related to the book topic. This year the book is "One Last Shot" by John Dean Anderson and the activity stations explore the science behind golf. Students also will have a chance to design their own mini-golf course and take a swing!

As guides, you will arrive at Penn Highlands Community College at 9:30, receive your assignment and then lead a group of students from station to station. Everything is well mapped out and operates very smoothly! Busses pick up the students at 1:30. Lunch is provided.

I have volunteered before and have signed up to do it again on Wednesday, May 17. I hope that some of you will join me on Wednesday, but if Wednesday doesn't work, Barb needs volunteers on Monday and Tuesday as well! I promise that you will enjoy the students and learn something as well!
