

ALICE is an acronym for Asset Limited, Income Constrained, Employed — households that earn more than the Federal Poverty Level, but less than the basic cost of living for the county (the ALICE Threshold).

Karen's presentation opened our eyes to the challenges in our own community. In 2021, 33% of Cambria households were below the ALICE Threshold. Explaining the impact economically and socially to these households and to our community at large was certainly an eye-opening experience. Thank you. Karen!

## "Programs to Tickle Your Intellectual Curiosity"

That rascally rodent Punxsutawney Phil claimed Spring was right around the corner, so the Program committee is ready to provide members with stimulating events to get you out of hibernation in the weeks to come:

On Thursday, February 29, Yamila Audisio Orlovsky (former assistant curator at JAHA and currently pursuing a master's degree in history from Slippery Rock while working as Communications Assistant at The Learning Lamp) will present a talk from 6:00 to 7:00 p.m. at the Cambria County Library Community Room. A native of Argentina, she will discuss her pursuit of citizenship with a talk entitled "Myth vs. Reality: My Long Journey to US Citizenship." She may even test us with questions from the citizenship exam.

March is Women's History month, so on Wednesday, March 20, from 6:00 to 7:00 p.m. at the Cambria County Library Community Room, Dr. Valerie Grash will present the first in a series of talks on Ordinary Women, Extraordinary Lives. Our topic this date will be Edith Warner, a simple Quaker schoolteacher from Philadelphia who, for health reasons, moved to Otowi Crossing, New Mexico in the late 1920s and endured tremendous economic hardship in the years during and after the Great Depression. In her desolate little house-turned tearoom—with no electricity and minimal comforts—she entertained Robert Oppenheimer and many of the scientists at Los Alamos secretly working on the atom bomb in the 1940s. She also developed close relationships with the residents of the nearby San Ildefonso pueblo, including the acclaimed potter, Maria Martinez. More talks in this series will be offered by various speakers soon, so keep an eye on your email and upcoming newsletters.

On Saturday, April 13, from 9:30-11:00 a.m., AAUW will host a roundtable discussion, "The Economic Impact of Women-Led Arts Organizations on Johnstown's Revitalization," at the John Murtha Center at UPJ. Participants include women leading the charge in this endeavor, representing not just non-profits and businesses, but also political representatives and others. This promises to be an excellent opportunity to engage both the university community and the general public. More details will be forthcoming as our committee is still hard at work putting together all the moving parts, but reserve the date now!

In the May-June newsletter, we will provide more details about our **end-of-year business meeting** which, once again, will be a potluck affair at **Hemlock Pavilion in Windber Rec Park. It will be held on Monday, May 20.** 

As always, we are interested in new ideas for programs—and new committee members to join our merry group.

The Education Committee met at The Morning Grind on January 5 th , and plans to meet there again on March 15th .

A warm welcome to two new AAUW members who have joined this Committee: Beth Stem and Rachelle Hrabosky. Each has a strong background in the educational field. Beth has agreed to be the liaison for the Minority Scholar Program.

2024 High School scholarships will be awarded to students from Conemaugh Township, Greater Johnstown, and Windber High Schools. For the first time, we are partnering with the Western Pa. Princeton Alumni Association and AAUW member, Laura Huchel, to present the Princeton Book Award to a high school junior.

The March meeting will focus on discussing whether the high school rotation and/or scholar selection process should be modified. Any proposed changes will be shared with members in advance of recommendations to the Board.

This year we plan on participating in a community-wide program, "Hope Springs Eternal: The Holocaust Project". Becky Catalinet is the Community project manager. Madeline Gyure and Kathy Howanek will be the AAUW contact persons for AAUW's part in this project. Currently four other members have agreed to assist in planning community-wide book displays and discussions on books having to do with women in the Holocaust. More details on this project will be forthcoming, and additional volunteers are welcome. We hope to complete our project by September.



# Should AAUW drop the degree requirement?

AAUW National is again suggesting that we open membership and that we drop the degree requirement. This issue has been presented to the national membership twice before, and nationally, the degree requirement has remained in place by only a very slim margin. In many ways the future viability of AAUW hinges on our vote this spring.

Voting starts in April and ends May 15. You will receive an email from Shannon Wolfe that will enable you to cast your vote. Watch your In-Box, and don't delete anything from Shannon! We had a good percentage of our branch voting two years ago. Let's do it again!

In the meantime, think about your vote and what it means to our Branch and to National.

Here are some of the Pro's and Con's of the argument:

**PRO** – Drop the degree requirement; allow open membership


- AAUW will be more inclusive of other women. There are many talented, communityminded women who would make our organization stronger and who do not have degrees.
- It makes sense in Johnstown to make ourselves more relevant to our community which has a lower percentage of women with degrees. We would be more representative of our community.
- AAUW still maintains its name, mission, activities, and interest in higher education for women and girls.
- AAUW National will have greater eligibility for grant money from corporations and foundations if we are more inclusive. It is extremely important that National find sources of income other than dues in order to continue to operate, to offer opportunities such as scholarships and fellowships to women and girls, and to maintain its research and advocacy activities.
- AAUW Johnstown Branch was founded 100 years ago to give like-minded women an opportunity to come together for academic and cultural pursuits. Society has changed. The degree is no longer necessary to make us like-minded, and our mission is broader.

#### **CON** – Maintain the degree requirement

- AAUW will no longer be different from other women groups if we allow members without degrees. Our members are university women.
- It has always been this way.

At the January Board meeting it was announced that UPJ has successfully become an AAUW College/University Affiliate. This process was completed following the efforts of UPJ Vice President of Student Affairs, Christian Stumpf. Dr. Stumpf has appointed Joyce Radovanic and Dr. Nina Girard as C/U liaisons to our branch. An initial meeting was held to discuss the next steps. It is important that we have a plan to program for students.

At the board meeting, a proposed 2024-25 budget was developed to present to the membership. The board also chose the recipients of the following awards:

**Gateway to Equity**: For dedication to and leadership in public education, particularly her role in the successful lawsuit against the Commonwealth, leading to reform in funding for K-12 public education, **Dr. Amy Arcurio**.

At the February membership meeting, the membership was presented with the proposed budget to be voted on in May. The membership also voted to approve an amendment to the Branch bylaws, adding the position of one College/University liaison to the Board and eliminating Historian as a Board member.
